THE OTHER NEWS FROM THE COURTS

In the equity suit of the Arnold Coal Company, limited, and William Metcalf, plaintiffs, vs. the Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Company, the master, N. S. Williams, Esq., has made his report to Common Pleas No. 2. The matter has been very stubbornly contested by M. A. Woodward for the plaintiffs and J. E. McKelvey and J. S. Ferguson for the defense. The hearings began on the 10th of July last.

It was claimed that the salt works of the delendants, at Natrona, were a sort of deadly upas, not only affecting the health of people in the vicinity, but vegetation as well, and that the baleful effects of noxious vapors were so destructive to vegetation on Jack's Island that the root decay was allowing the river to gradually dredge the island and river to gradually dredge the island and convey it to the future continent forming in the testi of Mexico. The testimony was very voluminous, being that of farmers, nechanics and scientists, pre-and ron. Plaintiffs asked for a preliminary and also a perpetual injunction to prevent defoudant from operating the works until it provides adequate means to prevent the allogen ovil effects complained of. Defendant denied or controverted the majority of the averments in the plaintiffs' bill.

FINDING OF THE MASTER.

The Master finds that plaintiffs' evidence was to the effect that the ores smelted are copper res, bearing gold and silver and containing lead and sulphur; that the smelling emits into the atmosphere gases, vapor and fumes containing lead, copper and suiphur; that Jack's Island is in danger of disintegration and deportation if the aforementioned fumes are allowed to continue to be emitted, and that the nexious gases, fumes and vapors are doing damage to the lands of the Arnoid Coal Company and William Bletcalf; that the means provided for cleaning the gases, etc., are the same as these employed in Great Britain, to a certain extent, but not so extensively and theroughly as in Great Britain; that these gases, etc., are harmful to animal and vegetable life in contact therewith; that taining lead, copper and sulphur; that Jack's that these gases, etc., are harmful to animal and vegetable life in contact therewith; that they are emitted into the atmosphere from a brick stack, 107 feet high; that in the immediate neighborhood of defendants' works a number of coke ovens throw large quantities of sulphur into the atmosphere; that defendants since Januars, 1888, and up to October, 1889, had treated between 17,000,000 and 18,000,000 pounds of the oras of the character above mentioned, and that from the ores so smelted have collected and shipped about three tons of merchantable lead, and that its policy was to obtain ores as tree from lead as possible, and the per cent of lead in each charge is kept as low as possible, not exceeding one-balt of 1 per cen, and that maintiffs and their families and servants have suffered slight pain and discomfort from inhaling these gases, etc.

He pauses to emark that the burden of proof being on the aintiffs to show the deleterious effects com-nined of, he regrets that they did not accept the profer of a test by defendants, and states that it was declined on the ground that the works could be so operated and manipulated during such test as to prevent the ordinary effects from being produced. There were occasions when to make public the deliberations of the board would complicate work very much.
