sleep beneath the sod. For the first time in many years the Grand Army of the Republic will not turn out in the usual grand parade which has distinguished this organization for years. The patriotism of the old soldiers is like the great nation itself-deathless, so long as a man of it lives who breathes its principles, and however much they would like to

march, their aged limbs refuse to act. The patriots who stood by the Stars and Stripes in the hour of danger, amid privation and want, have grown old in years, but their hearts are still with their dead com-rades, and they will remember them to-day in as impressive, it not auspicious, mauner as in the years gone by.

NOT FORMING A TRUST.

NOT DUE TO CARELESSNESS.

A Suit for Damages to a Coal Fleet Dis-

THE CITY'S BONDED DEBT.

Some Interesting Statistics Prepared for the Census Superintendent-The City's Linbility Being Slowly Decreased-Dates at Which the Bonds Mature.

City Controller Morrow last evening forwarded to Robert P. Porter, Superintendent of the Census, a tabulated statement cover-Pittsburg. The debt at the close of the fiscal year of 1889 was \$13,203,401. The Instal year of 1889 was \$13,203,401. The rate of interest paid is 7 per cent on \$5,43,500; 8 per cent on \$3,00,000; 5 per cent on \$3,331,393, and 4 per cent on \$4,087,097. The net debt of the city, if the sinking fund was used to take up bonds at once, would be \$10,026,805. The statement is as follows:

The bouded debt matures as follows: In 1893, \$425,800: 1894, \$212,500: 1895, \$283,200: 1896, \$1.188-3000: 1897, \$40,000: 1898, \$232,000: 1903, \$210,000: 1908, \$300,000: 1909, \$500,000: 1910, \$195,000: 1912, \$198,000: 1913, \$3,582,201; 1915, \$3,734,700. This debt has been slowly but steadily decreased and the sinking fund increased since 1880. The year 1885 shows an increase of debt, but this was only an apparent increase. A large amount of the old debt was refunded that year, just at the close of the fiscal year, and when the report was made up, the new bonds, at a lower rate of interest, had been issued, and the old bonds had not been called in, so on the books the city was charged with both.

Another point in the city's favor is in the interest account. This has been decreased each year, and, as it now stands, the city holds her bonds in the sinking fund to an amount that brings \$100,000 of the interest back into the city coffers.
