ORIGINAL PACKAGE TRADE.

As Far as Liquor is Concerned the Traffic is Placed Under

POLICE POWERS OF THE STATES.

No Other Article of Inter-State Commerce to be Affected.

OPPOSITION OF VEST AND VOORHEES

After a number of amendments the original package bill was yesterday passed by the Senate. It applies to nothing but intoxicating liquors, and will now go to the House for final action.

WASHINGTON, May 29 .- In the Senate to-day the bill subjecting imported liquors to the provisions of the laws of the several States was again taken up, the question being on the following substitute offered by Mr. Gray to the substitute reported from the | Court. Judiciary Committee:

That fermented, distilled or other intoxica ting liquors transferred as an article of commerce, or brought into any State or Territory from a point or place outside of such State or Territory for use, consumption or sale therein, shall not be exempt, nor shall the owner or person in possession thereof be exempt from the operation of the laws of, or the regulations, control, police or taxing power of such State or Territory affecting and applicable to all other like property, by reason of such liquors being in the original package of importation or trans-

SENATOR VEST'S IDEA.

Mr. Gray's amendment was agreed toyeas, 26; nays, 20; and then Mr. Vest moved to amend the substitute just adopted by making it apply to fresh beef, veal, mutton, lamb and pork, and argued that if the bill was to become a law it should not be confined to intoxicating liquors. He had not heard, however, an argument tending to show that the bill was in the right direction, or was anything else than an innovation on the established policy of the Government and on the decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States for the past 63 years.

It was the first time that he knew of the Supreme Court being a suggester of remedies. There were only two questions before the court in the Iowa case, and when the court went outside of them and said that it would suggest what could be done it was presenting a novel and unique proposition. Instead of the uniformity sought by the framers of the Constitution the proposed law would produce chaos, and "confusion worse confounded" as the ages should continue to progress.

EQUAL JUSTICE FOR ALL. But if he were wrong in his position in lature in regard to the exclusion of alcoholic stimulants. 


