A PLAN OF CAMPAIGN

TO BE MAPPED OUT BY THE REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE.

The Conduct of Congressional Contests to be Considered - Senator Quay's Views on the Subject-Work in the Doubtful Dis-

tricts to Begin at Once. INFECTAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.

WASHINGTON, June 2 .- The Republican Congressional Campaign Committee will meet to-morrow night and map out a plan of work for the fall campaign in the Congressional districts. The first work to be done is the election of a secretary-the place so long and ably filled by Mr. Edward Mc-Pharson, Clerk of the House of Representa tives.
