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

#### Many of the Stocks. NEW YORK, June 2 .- The stock market to-

day, when left to itself, was quiet with a steady to firm tone, but the bears were again very aggressive, and aided by the temporary scarcity of money incident to the first of the month and the transfer of large sums of money through certain large financial operations, they were enabled after the first hour of business to keep the market in a feverish and weak state, and bring about material losses in many stocks.
