THE MURDER AT CASTLE SHANNON.

Evidence That the Deceased and His Slayer Were Old Enemies.

A WOMAN WHO WAS SHOT BY ACCIDENT

The inquiry into the killing of Peter Soyle by Frank O. Morrison, at the Castle Shannon picnic Monday evening, was conducted yesterday afternoon by Coroner Mc-Dowell. Many colored people and quite a number of police officers were present.

Patrick Malone, a colored man living on Brady street, Soho, said that Soyle came from Philadelphia and had been working for the Panhandle at Bowerstown. They went to the picnic together, but Malone was not present when Soyle was killed in the blacksmith shop. Afterward he heard somebody say that Sovle had a knife.

Maria Jackson testified that on Monday morning Soyle went to her house in Clark's court, off Seventh avenue, and borrowed 25 cents. He told her that his wife was living in Harrisburg. At the pienie Miss Jackson saw Sovle oparreling with Morrison and heard Soyle say, "One of us has got to die." Morrison replied, "I don't want to fight you." Morrison ran away and Soyle followed. Miss Jackson said that she saw a knife in Soyle's hand, and at that she ran, frightened, in another direction.

Dr. Samuel McGogney examined Sovle soon after his death, in William Wrihland's shop, and afterward assisted Dr. Guy Me-Candless in making an autopsy. Dr. Mc-Candless testified that Soyle's death was caused by a blow and a nervous shock. QUARRELED OVER A KEG.

N. E. Girst, a colored man living on Penn avenue, said that at the pier four others made a pool and sent Morrison for a keg of beer. When the keg came, Girst, Washington Walls, Albert Davis cirst, Washington Walls, Albert Davis and Morrison took it to the blacksmith shop to drink it. Soyle and several others followed. Morrison told them not to come, but they did. At the shop the blacksmith, William Wrihland, handed Soyle a glass of beer. Soyle said something that angered the blacksmith, and they got to jangling. Morrison then told Soyle to leave, and the quarrel began. Soyle put his hand back as if to draw a weapon, and the witness caught hold of Morrison and tried to stop the row. Morrison said, "Let me go, Cheek. Don't you see that man's got a Enife?" Witness let go, and saw the blade of the knife in Soyle's hand. Morrison then picked up a hammer and threw it at Soyle. Just as he did so the witness caught Morrison and threw him out of the door. Girst did not see the hammer strike Soyle. Soyle did not hit Morrison, but made at him as if to do so. After throwing Morrison out of the shop, the witness and Morrison started down the road. They returned in a few minutes and the witness saw Soyle lying by the anyll dead.

The Coroner said, "You acted very badly to my man last night, Ed Girst." and Morrison took it to the blacksmith shot

DIDN'T KNOW IT. "Well, Judge," the witness replied, "I had liquor in my head and didn't know I hit him." The Coroner then gave Girst a severe lecture

on resisting officers. on resisting officers.

William Gibson said he was drinking beer in
the shop at the time and was so interested that he did not know anything about the fight, he did not know anything about the fight, which was very short. It started when he began to drink a glass of beer and was over before he had emptied the glass. The Coroner ordered Gibson to be held under bail.

Mrs. Annie Mosny, of No. 52 Wilson street, testified that the iead man was 28 years old, and that his true name was Samuel Sawyer.

Soyle's knife was shown. It is a dirk with a blade five inches long. Other witnesses corroborated Malone and Girst. Jennie Holman, of Jones' avenue, was called, but all she knew was that she had been shot in the knee by John Ailen. She said that the shooting was accidental. Allen was held for an information.

The inquest was adjourned until 10 o'clock this forenoon. Malone and Girst were held as witnesses, each under \$500 bail.
