"There should be a law forbidding the use of hypnotism by any one except a skilled physician," said Dr. Winslew. "I saw the operations of Prof. Charcot, the French savant, who is the head and soul of hypnotism in Europe, and to say the least, patients who are put under the influence should be in the hands of thoroughly competent physicians. It is a practical mental phenomenon that can be handled with safety only by expert. Quacks and charlatans strive to invest this play on the nervous system with supernatural characteristics in order to impose on credulous members of our community, but this state of hypnotism does not depend in any way on supernatural agencies."

The following additional rule relating to plumbing and house drainage in the city of Pittsburg is hereby established, viz.:
"Rule 5—Every sink, basin, bathtub, water closet, slop-hopper, and every fixture having a waste pipe, sball be furnished with a trap, which shall be placed as near as practicable to the fixture that it serves. Traps ticable to the fixture that it serves. Traps shall be protected from syphonage or air pressure by special air pipes of a size not less than the waste pipe or trap, but air pipes for water closet traps shall not be less than two (2) inches in diameter for thirty (30) feet or less, and of not less than three (3) inches in diameter for more than thirty (30) feet. Air pipes shall be run as direct as practicable, and shall be of not less than four (4) inches in diameter where they pass through the roof. Two or more air pipes may be connected together, or with a soil pipe, or carried independently above the roof, but in every case of connection with a soil pipe such connections shall be above the upper fixtures in the building."
