Irwin Has Secured the Plant of an Immens Plate Ginas Factory.

ISPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCE. 1 IRWIN, June 24.-Irwin has secured the immense plate glass works to be located north of the Pennsylvania Bailroad, All the neces-sary papers have been secured and signed, and, work will be begun in a few days.
