A SAND LEDGE FIGHT.

That May Lead to Blood-Letting in Westmoreland County.

TWO SHEEP DESTROYERS KILLED.

O. P. Houses Doing a Lively Business

at Leechburg and Beaver Falls. A CAVE-IN ANTICIPATED AT AVOCA.

And the Besidents Are Removing From the Town for Safety-General Tri-State News.

MPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCEL1 DERRY, June 25 .- This town is agog over recent developments near here. Mr. M. H. DeWitt, oil operator of Pittsburg, leased the property of one Beltz about a year ago. His lease expired about five or six months ago. Since the expiration of DeWitt's lease Mr. Ben C. Slocum, Jr., sand agent for Chambers & McKee, discovered a ledge of sand rock on the same property, and secured a lease. He is now engaged building a sand crusher at the foot of the Chestnut Ridge, and is about to begin the erection of an incline to connect the ledge with the crusher below. Last Saturday DeWitt and a couple of gentlemen arrrived, and after prospecting a few days made preparations to take possession of the ledge and hold it by force against Mr. Slocum. They had made arrangements to have lumber hauled up this morning, and had engaged carpen-ters to build a shanty on the ledge, and had engaged men to hold it against Slocum's

But Mr. Slocum was not sleeping. He got wind of the move, and believing that possession was nine-tenths of the battle, secured teams and a force of men and went up last night at 11 o'clock and built a shanty on the highest point of the ledge and awaited the coming of the enemy. When DeWitt's men arrived they were prepared to receive them and warned them to "keep off the grass." This they refused to do, but

built their fort on lower ground,

Both parties are now encamped on disputed territory and trouble is anticipated to-morrow, as any move made by either party will be resisted by the other, both par-ties being determined to maintain their position. The citizens of Derry are to a man in sympathy with Mr. Slocum, as to him alone is due the discovery of this glass sand rock and by his efforts the crusher and incline, or Sand Rock Bailroad, as it is called, have been located. They will support him in any move he may make.

EVERY MAN DREW A KNIFE. A Serious Riot of Italian Laborers Arrested at Brilliant.

The boss pulled his revolver and ordered all to stand back, which they rejused to do, and in an instant every man had drawn a knife with which be entened to curve the boss,

That gentleman finally succeeded in getting into his office unharmed and the crowd dispersed. An amicable adjustment was made, and the men were paid off and are at work to-day.
