A WAR UPON WOMEN.

BOTH SEXES HAVE THE BALLOT.

Edmunds Firmly Insists That General Debate Shall be Absolutely Unlimited in the Senate.

AN INTERNATIONAL BANK MEASURE

Favorably Reported to the House, With Som-Stringent Regulations.

WASHINGTON, June 26 .- In the Senate to-day the House bill for the admission of Wyoming as a State was taken up and Mr. Jones, of Arkansas, addressed the Senate. He declared himself in favor of the admission of Wyoming and of all the other Territories except Utah, when they had sufficient population and sufficient wealth to justify their assumption of State government. But he was unwilling to see W voming admitted in the way now proposed and he proceeded to state the reasons why, in his opinion, the passage of the pending bill would be exceedingly unwise.

There was no authority for holding s Constitutional Convention. The movement originated with and was sustained by a small minority. Another ground on which he based his opposition to the pending bill was the participation of women in the vote on the Constitution, The other grounds of his opposition were the constitutional pro-visions for woman suffrage, for the bolding of real estate by aliens and for compulsory ALL ON EQUAL GROUND.

In conclusion Mr. Jones declared himself in favor of passing an enabling act for all the Territories, except Utah, and admitting them as States after they had complied with the provisions of the act, and he moved as a substitute for the pending bill one for such an enabling act.
In the further course of his argument Mr.

Jones referred to the wives of Mormons in Wyoming and Idaho voting, and said, in naswer to Mr. Morgan, that he did not know how many wives each Mormon had to

vote with him.
"That depends," said Mr. Vance, "on the constitution of the individual, rather than that of the State."

Mr. Stewart replied to Mr. Jones and said that it would be time enough to act on the cases of other Territories when they were before the Scante. They were not before it now. Wyoming and Idaho had formed constitutions and had applied for admission. New Mexico and Arizons had not done so There was a disposition on all sides to ad mit those Territories as soon as possible. The bill or Wyoming was now before the Senate and should be acted upon. AGAINST WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

Mr. Reagan opposed the bill. He argued against the provision for woman suffrage contained in the Wyoming Constitution. The effect of that provision was, he said, to make men of women, and correlatively, to make women of men. He supposed that they were to have women in public offices, women to do military duty, women to work on the roads, and men to wash the dishes, nurse the bables, and stay at home, while the women were making stump speeches. It was only latterly that people had become wiser than their Creator, and wiser than all the generatians that had preceded them. The Constitution of Wyoming should go back to the people for their more careful

and deliberate consideration.
At the close of Mr. Reagan's speech an understanding was reached that the vote on the bill and amendments would begin at 4 o'clock to-morrow. In reference to that agreement Mr. Edmunds wanted it underthe Senate. There ought to be one body in the country, he said, where there was free-dom of debate.




