SEVERE STORM AT CANTON.

Houses Unroofed, Electric Car Wrecked and Other Damage Done.

SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCEL1 CANTON, June 30 .- A violent storm swept

over this city this atternoon, doing great damage. It came in shape of a cloud burst accompanied by sharp lightning and heavy wind. It came so very suddenly that all were unprepared, and many hardly had time to get within doors before it was upon them. Walnut street soffered the most severely, being inun-

Street suffered the most severely, being imm-dated several feet from North street to the fuscarawas yards. Cellars were flooded, and in some instances hauschold goods were washed away.
