The Senate Will Probably Pass the Bill This Week Admitting Idaho Into the Sisterhood.

THE DEBATE ON THE TARIFF BILL Will be Resumed at the Earliest Opportunity—Commemorative Service in Honor of S. S. Cox Adjourned.

CRUISER PHILADELPHIA ACCEPTED. New Bills Introduced and Miscellaneous News From the Nation's Capital.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—In the Senate today Mr. Evans gave notice that, on account of the absence (from illness) of Mr. Voorhes, he desired to take part in the commemorative services in respect to the late Mr. S. S. Cox, of New York, these services, which had been fixed for to-morrow, would be still further postponed until Tuesday of next week.

THE TARIFF BILL NEXT. Mr. Gorman said that there had been no understanding arrived at, as was usual, as to the order of business, and that the tariff business would be very much facilitated if the Senator from Vermont would fix a time when the tariff bill could be considered—the latter part of this week or the beginning of next week.

Mr. Morrill said that it was not his purpose to interfere with appropriation bills or with conference reports, but he repeated that as early a moment as possible the tariff bill would be called up.

Mr. Tamm announced that the tariff bill would not be concluded this week. The Senate would probably adjourn on Thursday till Monday, and probably on the latter part of the week.

Mr. Platt said the Senate ought to get through with the Idaho bill to-morrow. \$2,000 TO INVESTIGATE INSECTS. The agricultural appropriation bill was taken up. Mr. Coker moved to amend the paragraph appropriating \$25,000 for investigating the history and habits of insects by increasing the appropriation \$2,000 and directing that amount to be expended in investigations into the natural history of insects for the year 1930.

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THE NEW CRUISER. An Information Accepted of the Philadelphia Made Yesterday. WASHINGTON, June 30.—Captain Erben, President of the board appointed to try the cruiser Philadelphia, had an interview with the Secretary of the Navy to-day. He reported that the vessel had made an average speed of 19 1/2 knots per hour over a 40-mile course, and consequently had more than met her contract requirements. He said he would submit a written report on the subject to-morrow.

A NEW COMMISSION. Bill Calling for an Examination of Social Disabilities Passed. WASHINGTON, June 30.—Representative Laws to-day introduced a bill providing for the appointment by the President of a commission, consisting of five persons, to make an impartial and thorough investigation of social vice in all its phases, in relation to labor and wages, marriage and divorce, and the general welfare of the people.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS. Desired to Carry Out the Provisions of the Disability Bill. WASHINGTON, June 30.—The Secretary of the Interior to-day transmitted to the House an estimate of an additional appropriation of \$301,000 to carry out the provisions of the disability bill, signed by the President last Friday.

A Large Felling Off. WASHINGTON, June 30.—It is estimated at the Treasury Department that there has been a decrease of about \$50,000 in the public debt since June 1. This will make the total decrease for the fiscal year ended to-day \$87,800,000, as against \$114,000,000 for the previous fiscal year.
