The Body of Miss Maggie Creed Recovered at Johnstown.

INFECTAL TELEGRAM TO THE DEPATCH. JOHNSTOWN, July L-The Creed family was one of the most prominent and wealthy resid-ing on Washington street at the time of the food, and the father, mother and five children
