NO BOSSISM FOR HIM

Ex-Congressman George W. Crouse, of Akron, Ohio, Though an Uncompromising Republican,

TAKES NO STOCK IN DELAMATER.

He Thinks Porter's Catechism Good Enough as Far as it Goes, But Doesn't Go Far Enough.

THE PEDERAL ELECTION BILL NO GOOD.

Mr. Crouse Says It Would Bring Disaster on the Republican Party.

Ex-Congressman George W. Crouse, of Akron, O., one of the most extensive manufacturers of reapers and mowers in the United States, was at the Anderson yesterday. Mr. Crouse is also President of the Charleroi Plate Glass Company, and frequently comes to Pittsburg on business. When found at the hotel he was scanning Mr. Porter's list of questions to manufac-

turers published in yesterday's DISPATCH. "What do I think of them?" he replied, smiling, to the first query, "Weil, they don't go far enough. That is the main objection I have, and when I explain you will understand. To begin with, Mr. Porter assures manufacturers that they need have no tear of their answers being used against them, and that in itself is a giveaway. A business man should not be afraid to furnish information. There should be nothing that would come back and club a man. Now, it I should answer Mr. Porter's questions just as they are and go no further, my business would show up as one of the most profitable in the country, when in reality we are scarcely making anything and prices are all

SHOULD BE EXPERTS.

"Mr. Harrison or the Supervisor are no doubt honest and good men, but such questions should be framed by experienced men for every industry. I have no objections to going to the bottom and showing up everything. If this were done it would completely disarm the demagogue and satisfy

the working people.
"I know the tendency to-day is to feel that the rich are getting wealthier and the poor more poverty-stricken. Some feel that the tariff is intended only to benefit the manufacturer, and that enormous profits are made in business. My impression is that Mr. Porter has such ideas in his mind from the manner in which he asks for information. In my business there is a great difference between the shop cost and the real cost. Any intelligent mechanic knows just what the ma-terial and labor are figured at, but more of to sell my machines—more, by far, than it costs me to make the crop, but I don't see that any of Mr. Porter's questions don't that fact. None of them touch on the cost of keeping agents on the road, storage and transfer bills, freight, office hire, loading and unloading materials and machines at the shop, and a thousand and one other little extras that are overlooked by the people, but which the manu-

facturer is forced to pay. SOME OF THE EXTRAS.

"Frequently I ship a machine at a moment's notice, and maybe have to send a man along to put it together, and stay a day or so to teach the farmer how to work it. offered. All this requires money. Yes, I repeat again that it costs more to put the machines market than it does to make them, and this is the result of a ruinous competisenses some day and see the folly of such

"If Mr. Porter's questions would bring out all these tacts, then I would have no objection to answering them. What I have said of my business, however, I don't think is true of all other inquetries. I have simply given the worst side of it, but one that must not be overlooked.

Concerning the silver legislation and the Federal election bill, Mr. Crouse stated that on the silver question he was inclined to agree with the President and Secretary of the Treasury. He had no objection to issuing a paper dollar for a dollar's worth of silver. There would be no harm in that, but when it came to putting silver on the same basis with gold, there are other countries that have something to say about that. It is when stock. they would refuse to accept our silver dollars in exchange for gold that the trouble would begin. When gold is at a premium there is something wrong.

Mr. Crouse admitted the country and its business were growing rapidly, but it was useless to expand the money system beyond natural laws. The extreme silver men, he argued, would be in the same position as the farmer who should demand that the Government buy all his wheat as fast as he raised it. Other producers would have the same privilege, and what would become of the country.

"As for the Federal election bill, I am a Republican," he continued, "but the passage of the bill wouldn't help the party, It will only bring detent. To bring the question home, we people in this State or Onio would not submit to having our elections superintended by Federal officers, and neither will the citizens of North Carolina stand it. The bill will not pass the Senate, but if it should become a law it would create trouble. I sympathize with the Republican party, but such a measure will not
