How Letters Are Copied In One of the Wall Street Offices.

ew York Sun. They use a clotheswringer for a letter press in one of the largest Wall street telegraph offices. The messages to be copied are treated as usual until the time for the putting of them into the press; then, instead of the ordinary screw press, which it takes time and muscle to use, the message and damp tissue copy paper are simply run through a clotheswringer. The rubber rollers answer every purpose of a press, and the operation is almost instantaneous and much easier than the usual way. The machine is placed at a basement window, and there is always a little throng on the sidewalk watching the boys wring out messages.
