PETECIAL TELEGRAN TO THE DISPATCE. COLUMBUS, July 14.—The meeting of the Executive Board of the National Mineworkers of America, to be held here tomorrow, will be of unusual interest and importance. The board will consider the Dunbar disaster, and it is not improbable steps will be taken to institute heavy damage suits against the company owning the mine. Should the suits be brought they will be instituted by the United Mineworkers' Association, in behalf of the victims of the disaster. The association will furnish the finances necessary and the suits will be instituted in the names of the de-

pendent relations. Another matter of national interest, concerning which action will be taken, is the situation in Illinois, where the miners are demanding an increase in their scale of wares. The ing an increase in their scale of warés. The trouble between the miners and operators in that State has reached such a state that it is regarded as quite probable that the Executive Beard will to-morrow order out about 30,000 men, thus precipitating the largest strike in the West for many years. The Northern Illinois operators agreed to grant an advance of 7½ cents a ton, on condition that the Southern Illinois operators keep nace with them in the payment of wages. Unless the increase is granted, the board will demand that the scale be made the same as in Ohio and Pennsylvania.


