BUFF HIDES AND CALF SKINS FIRM. Absentmindedly Demanded for Fruits and Vegetables.

The hide market continues to give signs of strength. Buff hides and calf skins are in active demand and prices are steadily higher.

There was nothing especially new in features or conditions at the city banks Saturday. All of the institutions visited reported a good supply of funds and a good discount business for the season.

The clearing house reported a gain of \$4,000,000 over the same week last year. As this represents real business, not speculation, it is peculiarly indicative of the steady development of the activities of the city.

NEW YORK STOCKS. An Extreme Dulness on the Exchange—Railroad Bonds Very Quiet—Large Exports of Specie Will Benefit the American Markets.

NEW YORK, August 3.—The stock market, after a dull and listless opening, showed a moderate dullness to-day, the transactions falling up only 20,000 shares of listed stocks and 15,000 of railroad bonds.

Exports of specie from the port of New York for the week ending August 2, 1890, were \$1,800,000 in gold and \$1,800,000 in silver.

In cereal lines the marked feature of the week's trade has been the upward movement of the wheat market.

The general drift of trade is toward a higher level of prices. Syrups, canned fruits and vegetables are all moving upward.
