NEED OF A NEW CHURCH.

The corner stone of the old church was laid in 1857. For several years the building has been inadequate to the wants of the large and increasing congregation, and it was found necessary to secure a larger building. The new church will be 170 feet long by 86 feet wide, including a baptismal chapel. The body of the church proper will be 68 feet wide. It will cost \$66,520 exclusive of the furniture.
