Judd & Geiser, outside of the North Penn Oil Company, are the heaviest opera-tors in this part of the gray sand, and at present are doing more work than the Standard. They have 65 pumping wells, which yield them a monthly production of 9,000 barrels. At present they are running five strings of tools. On the Edwards No 15 is drilling at 1,000 cet. No. 17, same farm, is spudding; No. 53, Bissell, is down 1,500 feet; No. 3, Bissell, 500 feet, and No. 50, Bissell, is in the sand, showing for a good well. 
