WAILING FOR WATER.

A Council Committee Listens to the Complaints of Residents of the Southside Hilltops.

VERY FILTHY AND LITTLE OF IT.

The Monongahela Company Officials Say They Are Working Hard to Provide a Remedy.

TALK OF FORMING A BUCKET BRIGADE

A Visit of Inspection to be Paid to the Southsid Water Works.

The Monongabela Water Company's espacity for supplying the Southside with enough water which shall not contain the germs of typhoid tever or other diseases, is to be investigated by a special committee of Councils on Friday afternoon.

The committee held a meeting in Select Council Chamber yesterday afternoon, at which Hon. A. C. Robertson presided. The dissatisfied citizens of the Southside had been requested to attend, as were the officials of the water company. There were not many of the former present, and those who were there came from the Thirty-fifth ward. Mr. G. L. Holliday, President of Common Council, opened the proceedings by stating that the citizens of the Thirty-fifth

pointed a committee of six gentlemen to state their grievances to this committee. Southside residents and patrons of the Monongahela Water Company living in different portions of the hill district. Mr. Robertson read the statements, which disclosed a terrible state of affairs. The more striking complaints, with the name of the complainants, are as follows:

SERIOUS COMPLAINTS. Mr. McGeary-I built a bathroom recently but have little use for it, as we have so little water. I have been carrying water up from Carson street for months past. The Virginia avenue main beloed matters a little, but if any thing happens at the works they shut off this line without notice. The Southside has outgrown the Monongabela Water Company's plant, and the quality of the water furnished is very bad. The city should supply the Southside with water. The pumping station on the hill has not sufficient capacity and is in a filthy condition. It has sewers all around it. Mr. Kessner-I have been out of water for 30 hours at a time. A few days ago I had to build a fire in the yard for fear of blowing up

my range. When we had bydrant water it was bad we could not use it. Mr. Moran-We have to keep a supply of water in bath and wash tubs. It is a common thing to find worms in the pipes. The run from which the water is pumped is full of fith. We pay for sprinkling hose, but haven't water

Mr. John Goehring-We have not had water on Saturdays for four or five months. I went to the company's office and told them I had been out of water half the time. They told me I ought to be satisfied if I got any water, and that the people on the nill used to be glad to get water one month in the year. I think this outrage should not be tolerated. Mr. Frank-We have a poor supply of water and the quality is very bad. It is not fit to use. When I went to the office and asked for a reduction on my bill I was told to go to the

devil. I paid my hi' and went away. PRETTY SOLID WATER. Mr. McIntosh-I have been without water three days in a week. The water is very bad, Last week I could have brought it over in a graphs at reduced rates. Try them. Good

Mr. Schutte-Four or five days at a time we can get but a few drops of water. I have seen the influent pine full of offal.

Mr. Turner—I am out of water two-thirds of the time. Every morning I take two buckets to the foot of the incline, and when I go home in the evening I take the buckets up full of water.

Mr. Cooper—I have been thinking seriously of organizing a bucket brigade. It is a necessity for the hill district. for the hill district.

After reading this statement of grievances, Chairman Robertson called upon the Menongahela Water Company officials for

their side of the story. President Watson arose and said that the books of the company were open for inspection at any time. The company has re-cently spent \$410,000 in laying larger pipe

and putting in new pumping engines. A new 20-inchrising main is now being laid to relieve the people of the Thirty-fifth ward. The trouble complained of has been caused by the grading of Grandview avenue. A 4-inch pipe was laid there years ago, and the street contractors broke it. The company is now putting in an 8-inch line, and when it is completed there will be plenty of water on the hill. "With the new system now being built," said President Watson, "and a new 10,000,000-gallon pump, I see no reason why the supply should not be all right." BLAMED ON THE GAS.

In reply to questions Mr. Watson said that the pumping engines had to shut down for a few hours a few days ago because the natural gas supply failed and the furnaces had to be changed to burn coal. The dirt in the water is caused by the freshets, which force coul dust and dirt into the basin. It is the duty of the city to open the fire plugs occasionally to allow the dirty water to run off. Mr. Watson lived in Allegheny, and the water there was often so dirty that he hated to bathe in it. It cooked like soup. The Monongabela Water Company was prepared to spend money to remedy any

reasonable grievance.
Chairman Robertson called the attention of the officials to the complaints of discour-teous treatment received by patroas of the company. He also thought it was the duty of the company to notify consumers when the water was about to be shut off.
Right here Mr. Ferguson moved that

when the committee adjourned it should re-convene at 1:30 P. M. Friday for the purpose of visiting the Monongahela Water Company's plant and determining whether or not it had sufficient capacity.

Mr. Shannon thought enough grievances

had not yet been presented upon which the committee could act. He offered an amendment to the effect that the meeting on Fri-day be held to give the Southsiders another chance to present their grievances.

WANTED EXPERTS. experts should be engaged to go with the committee. He did not think the gentle-

Mr. John Geary thought that a couple of men of the committee knew much about water works, and their opinion would not he of greater value than that of so many

street car drivers. Mr. Robertson informed the gentleman that the committee had no power to employ experts, but if the citizens wanted them they could have them if they paid for them. Mr. McCord thought the committee had wandered away from the main question, which was the quality of the water. He had been informed by an official of the company that they could not remedy this. If this was the case the Southside citizens should seek elsewhere for relief. No fact is

better established than that impure water distributes the germs of typhoid fever. The company says it will give as more water, but if it is of the same quality it will not help as much.

President Watson said analyses of the water had shown it to be good, and that the Monongabela river furnishes the best water of any river in the world. When typhoid fever was raging in Allegheny Mr. Watson

and several other gentlemen used to send demijohns to the Southside for drinking water. This, he thought, ought to settle the question of purity. Mr. Helliday then made a speech in which he illustrated the lack of water on the Southside, and he demanded of Councils one of two things-that the Monongabels

Water Company furnishes sufficient water, or that the city does it. At the time the company obtained its charter he thought it was a mistake and voted against it. Now he knew it was a mistake.

Engineer Stengel, of the company, made a statement to show how the supply was being improved, and the bookkeeper denied

the charges of discourtesy.
