# FIRE FIENDS AT WORK.

#### Young Man Locked in a Burning House and Badly Burned.

# THE MOROCCO STRIKE.

One Thousand Men Out, and the Trouble May Extend.

LYNN, MASS., August 18 .- One thousand men are now out of employment, owing to the morocco finishers' strike, although the finishers of one factory are alone directly concerned in the strike. All are watching the tanners and beamsters. After the trouble in 1889 these workmen






