"School was out, but we found the teacher upstairs in the schoolroom. The lower apartment was used for housekeeping by the teacher's family. It was not a private insti-tution, but a public school. About all the schools in Europe were closed for vacation, and we had no opportunities for examining the foreign educational systems. "Everything over there in the line of food

and so on is dearer than in the United States, with the solitary exception of clothing. English woolen suits cost less than one-half the price of the same kind of goods in this country. We found all the workingmen struggling along on a diet of potatoes, with a change to meat about once a week. If we had told them that the American workingman sees meat every day they would have doubted the statement.

"The subjects of paramount importance that occupy the minds of Europeans at pres-ent are difficult to ascertain if one does not understand the native languages, but from the contents of the newspapers it is evident that the coming World's Fair in Chicago is little thought of, owing to the fact that there are no hustling American newspapers over there to stir them up.
