

All the Accommedations Taken Up at Willlams' Grove.

INPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH. WILLIAMS' GROVE, PA., August 25 .-This is the biggest Monday Williams' Grove has had since the organization of grangers' picnics. Nearly 3,000 people arrived here by railroad and many came in vehicles and on foot. To-night over 2,000 persons are camping on the grounds, occupying the numerous cottages and tents dis-tributed through the upper portion of the grove. The supply of accommodations is inadequate to the demand, and houses within a radius of two miles having any extra rooms to hire out have been utilized for sleeping purposes.
