Custer into Sitting Bull's village will be brought from Harrison county, Ind., to the insane asylum in this city to-day. His name is Wade Erans, and he is aged about 45 years. His relatives knew that he was with Custer and supposed that he had been killed, but three years later he was by accident found in an insane hospital at Washington, D. C. His reason had been par-tially restored, and he related many incidents of the great massacre, but could not tell where he had been since the fight or how he came to be in the asylum. He was brought to his home in Harrison county, where he remained a short time, when he suddenly disappeared, and nothing was heard of him again until about a year ago, when he came home apparently sane and in excellent bealth. He refused to say where he had been or what he had been doing, and the matter is still a great mystery. A few months ago his reason again began to totter and is now completely dethroned. Very little can be learned of his history, but it is known beyond doubt that he was with Custer, that he made his escape, and that his insanity was produced by fright in the terrible massacre.
