The six-inch pipe has since been laid and connected, and of course the pressure at the well is relieved. But its production is sufficient to supply all the patrons of the company, and does supply them with an abundance of gas for the present.

On the McGabey farm Peiffer, Roth & Dyer have just finished another fifth sand gamer of greater capacity than the other. This inst one is certainly a first-class roarer, as it registered 450 pounds pressure to the square inch in one minute. The rock pressure is probably the same at both wells, as they are so near each other, and this is probably over 800 pounds to the square

Between these wells and this city there has not been a well drilled to the fifth sand. The prospects are good, therefore, for developing an extensive gas belt, possibly of nu area equal to that of the Murraysville or Grapeville fields. Of course, it may be much smaller. The point is that there are no developments to indicate the area yet.

### A Fifth Sand Gasser.

Last Thursday the fifth sand furnished another large gasser north of the Taylorstown field. It is not on the same time as the McGahey wells, being located several miles west, near the Middletown road. This well is owned by the Forest Oil Company and was drilled for oil. It is near the lines of several of the gas companies, but will probably be turned over to the Natural Gas

Between this well and the Ohio river there are no fifth sand developments to stand in the way of extension of the gas field. Of course, it is not expected a belt will be found running through so far as that, or bulf so far. It could furnish an enormous quantity of gas if one-tenth that extent. On

the south side is the Taylorstown oil field, about two miles distant. The oil field is far chough away not to affect the gas pressure much in the vicinity of this well. All of these wells are in

and indicate a supply of natural gas for the coming winter greater than that of last winfor and the outlook does not seem gloomy even for the winter of 1891-92. One of these fields may be diverted from Pittsburg and taken to Wheeling, but even without that there would seem to be no cause for alarm.
