Dr. Campbell Tells the Directors How to

Run Their School.

SECRETARY SMITH'S EXPLANATION

At the trial, which was before Judge Magee, District Attorney Johnston appeared for the prosecution and Thomas M. Marshall jepresented the defense. Joseph Shoot, the boy who was with Barnhart at the time of the accident, testified that when the driver came back to put them off the wagon he jumped and ran away, but that the driver jumped and caught Barnhart and threw him against the side of the cable car and he fell under it and was run over.

E. I. Elderkin, the defendant, was put on the stand, and testified that he bad not touched the boy. When he ran back the boys both ran, and Barnhart was caught by the cable car. He said he went to put the boys off the wagon, because he had been sick and was suffering from nervousness and rhoumatism. Others testified in the prosecution and defense, and the attorneys both talked to the jury, After the judge's charge the jury retired, and in an hour returned a verdict of guilty of voluntary manslaughter. Elderkin was released on bail pending sentence. The site for the blind asylum has not yet been settled, and it is possible that the "picnic tract" will not be given for the school. Dr. Campbell of London, yesterday in-formed the directors of the institute that he convinced Mrs. Schenley that the picuic tract was away out of the road and was no place to build a blind school. The lady is taking more than a passing interest in the school, and it is probable that a site nearer

to Penn or Fifth avenues will be given. Dr. Campbell arrived in the city yesterday and registered at the Hotel Duquesne. He was accompanied by his wife and left last evening, on the 9:20 train via the Baltimore and Ohio road, for Washington. In the afternoon he met the Board of Directors of the institute and gave them much valuable information about the management of the Pittsburg school. He said he met Mrs. Schenley the day after his interview with the Pittsburg party that went to see her. She regretted very much the past trouble among the directors, and made a recommendation to avoid any unpleasantness in the future. She said she would like to see the rotary election system adopted, that is, instead of electing a whole new board each year, to elect only three members, the others holding over. By doing this the board would never ony: A. E. Garbeck, N. G. Cool, Louis Meyer, and there could be no friction between those retiring and the newly elected directors. The board will adopt the suggestion of Mrs. Schenley arter the expiration of this term.

He said he would like to see one special department created in the new institute for an inuustrial school, where blind children could be taught practical and useful trades. He also said it would be necessary to have ample playgrounds around the building, where children could frolic and get tilenty of exercise.
