COURT NEWS OF TESTERDAY IN BRIEF

The fate of Frank Grade, indicted for the murder of his step-daughter on the 15th of last March, is now in the hands of the jury. All day yesterday the case was argued and at was 6:30 last evening when Judge Magee finished his charge to the jury. Attorney Dicken opened the argument for the defense and was followed by W. D. Moore, Esq., and between them three hours were cousumed. The defense laid particular stress on their plea of insanity and insisted on an acquittal. District Attorney Johnston made a masterly argument to the jury, going over every bit of the testimony and explaining it with the minutest detail. The expert testiit with the minutest detail. The expert testimony of Drs. Wiley, Chessrown, McCord and
others was treated lightly and, the District
Attorney argued, could bear but little weight,
as more of them had seen the prisoner until
some time after the commission of the act.

Judge Magec'began his charge at 5° clock and
finished it at 820. His Honor confined himself
strictly to the laws bearing on the case, paying
particular attention to explaining what a strictly to the laws bearing on the case, paying particular attention to explaining what a reasonable doubt was. Expert testimony was also taken up and his Honor stated that to a certain extent it was good evidence but the jury could take it with considerable allowance. During the entire day the prisoner sat silently in his chair looking directly in front of him, never for a moment shifting his attitude or changing the posicion of his eyes.

THE POOL-SELLING CASE.

Judge White Thinks Herdic Should be In-

dicted by the Grand Jury. The hearing asked for on Monday by William Yost, Esq., for leave to produce evidence to sustain his petition for the return to the grand jury of the case against Frank Herdic, was held before Judge White, yesterday morning. Mr. Herdic had been charged with selling pools at the Homewood races last July, Captain Wishart being the prosecutor. The grand jury Wishart being the prosecutor. The grand jury ignored the bill and placed the costs on Mr. Wishart. Mr. Yost petitioned the Court to take them off, and also to return the case to the grand jury. His evidence to show cause for his plea Le produced in the persons of Policeman White, George Fisher and Bruce Cunningham, together with pool tickets sold by Herdic. White and Fisher did not buy tickets, but saw them sold. Cunningham had bought them.

Mr. Yost said these three had given the same testimony before the grand jury, and other testimony before the grand jury, and other witnesses had been excused. He offered to produce them. Judge White said that was enough. William Hunter, Esq., for Mr. Herdic said there was not a bit of evidence to hold Herdic, but Judge White said there had been plenty. and enough to warrant the grand jury in find ing a true bill. He took the papers and prom-ised an early decision.

A MIXED UP CASE.

Questionable Who Really Did Use the Knife nt a Picnic.

In the Criminal Court, yesterday, a stir was eated by Judge White. William Ambrose had been on trial for aggravated assault and battery on John Thurroff, the result of a row at a picnic at Butcher's Grove last June. At trial several witnesses testified that it was Ambrose who struck Thurroff, while others testified that it was John Hartman. Hartman testified that it was John Hariman. Hariman was placed on the stand, but declined to say whether or not be had hit Thurroff. Judge White ordered him to give \$1,000 bail for his appearance on the charge of assaulting Thorroff. The jury in the case returned a verdict of not guilty and placed half the costs on the prosecutor. Judge White became indignant and ordered the verdict set aside as to the grossecutor. He then directed the County Detective to enter information against Hartman for aggravated assault and battery and against Ambrose, John Hemmidish and John Redman, who testified that it was Hartman struck Thurreff. County Detective Beltzhoover went before Alderman Reilly and lodged the informations. Hartman and Ambrose gave bail for a hearing and warrants were lesued for the others.

WANT ALL THE CASH.

The American Wire Company Sue the Chicago Company on a Contract. The American Wire Company yesterday filed a statement in their suit against the Chicago Wire and Spring Company. They stated that the defendant agreed to purchase from them 1,000 tons of soft fence wire rods, at \$50 per ton. They shipped them the rods as per contract, and they received and paid for the first shipments, amounting to 304,250 pounds. The balance, 1,885,740, the defendants refused to take. As a consequence, they were obliged to sell the rods where they could elsewhere.

They did not realize within \$8,016.35 of the contract price with the defendants, and now sue to recover that amount from them.
