Wildwood field has shown no abatement in the past few days. The Ringheiser well, on the southwest line and about three-quarters of a mile from the Harbush wells, is nearing the sand and attracting considerable attention. If it turns out well it will give the field another boom and stimulate a large amount of new work in this locality. The Smith Farm Oil Company, on the Smith, got another pay to-day in their No. 2, which has been regarded as a very ordinary producer, and its production is now estimated at 100 barrels a day. Their No. 3 is

Zinkheim, but the chances are they will not get in before morning. The Roth Oil Company's Nos. 1, 2 and 3. Harbush, in the last 24 hours, produced 422 barrels. The same company's No. 1, Bryant, is doing 75 barrels and their No. 2. Kretzer, 300 barrels. There is no change at the other wells.


