Section 1—Be it ordained and enacted by the city of Pittshurg, in Select and Common Councils assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same. That all corporations formed for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power, or any of them, to the public by means of electricity which shall hereafter obtain, by an ordinance duly passed and approved, the consent of the Councils of this city to enter upon, over or under, or use or occupy any of the streets, lanes, alleys or highways, or parts thereof, within the city for any purpose shall, upon the passage and approval of such ordinance, and upon the acceptance of this general ordinance, have and be declared to possess the right, under this general ordinance, to enter upon, over or under, and to occupy and use the same under and subject to the following regulations:

First—Every such company before entering Intions:
