

WASHINGTON, PA., October 15 .- The preliminary hearing of Edward Durr and Bush Durr, two of the party of three charged with the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Saunders, was held before 'Squire D. M. 
Unknown Robbers Steal Stamps and Cash at Jenera and Escape.




