The Australian Ballot Method Advocated by Single-Tax Men,

SUFFRAGE IN SECRET

AS AGAINST THE SPYING SYSTEM.

Engineer Deloss Everett Addresses Railroaders in Meeting.

BARBEES TO HOLD AN ANNIVERSARY

Though the interesting subject of "Ballot Reform" had been advertised for discussion at the meeting of the Single Tax League last evening, the attendance was sparse. Three leaguers, four ordinary mortals and a DISPATCH representative composed the gathering, when Mr. Edmund Zurdley recited the "Battle of Naseby," by Macaulay, as a sort of introductory to the proceedings. Subsequently five other citizens appeared. That so few were present may or may not be laid to the account of the weather-which was moist.

When Secretary Roberts had read the principles of the League, President Zardley called on Mr. J. J. Quinn to speak to the question of "Ballot Reform." Mr. Quinn iescribed the cause which led Francis S. Dutton, a member of the South Australian begislature, as early as 1851, to originate e system of secret voting which has since became known as the "Australian Ballot System." He explained the workings of the system and illustrated, from his own experiences, the impossibility of a free voter casting his ballot as he might desire without running risk of discharge by his employer or losing cast and friends by running counter to their wishes. Under the existing system he declared no man can vote secretly.

AT THE MERCY OF HEELERS.

The voter was not his own master, nor a free agent, but to a large degree at the mercy of the heelers and others who make a living by spying on voters on election day. He said that the Australian system was in operation in most English-speaking countries, including Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, New South Wales, New Zeaand, Great Britain and Ireland British Columbia, Outario, Canada, Quebec, Nova Scotis and Manitoba; and in the United States it was the law in Ken-States it was the law in Ken-tucky, Massachussetts, Wisconsin, Rhode Island, Indiana, Missouri, Ten-nessee, Montana and Minnesota. The measure was defeated in this State in the House by a majority of Republicans opposing it-a majority of Democrats favoring it. never came to a vote in the Senate, being eferred to a committee consisting of Senaors Cooper, Reyburn and MacFarlane, who were opposed to the bill. The record of the ouse shows that the following representavives from Allegheny county voted against honest elections, pursued Mr. Owen, name-ly Charles W. Robison, James L. Graham, William T. Marshall, James F. Richards, David E. Weaver, William H. McCullough and William H. White. The condition in Pennsylvania to-day was, said Mr. Owen, that it was the man who knocked out the ballot system that has his man up for Governor. It was the duty of the people to vote for the Democratic nominee because he was disposed to give them an honest system of balloting.

WHAT THE VOTE SHOULD BE.

Mr. Yardley affirmed that in a free counry the vote should be the true expression of the popular mind. Under the Australian system voters could not augment their in-come by selling their votes as they did so freely in New York, and perhaps here.
