IN SELF DEFENSE, AS HE CLAIMED.

His Counsel Spring a Sensational Point, Which is Overruled, but Will Not Be Forgotten.

Had Done No Wrong. John Paradine was placed on trial before

Judge White vesterday on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. The defendant was indicted for killing J.

M. Campbell, a veterinary surgeon, 74 years old. Some boys were teasing Campbell, when he turned on them and struck a son of the defendant. Mr. Paradine then struck Campbell, and it was claimed the blow

caused his death. After the jury in the case had been drawn and placed in the box, W. J. Brennen, Esq., and William Reardon, Esq., counsel for the defense, moved to quash the whole array of jurors. Mr. Brennen stated that the Sheriff and Jury Commissioners did not draw the panel legally. Mr. Brennen further argued that it has been the habit for years to do the drawing with-

been the habit for years to do the drawing without taking the eath prescribed by law, considering that the eath of office taken by them would
cover all legal proceedings. The law, however,
makes it obligatory upon them to take a special
oath every time they make a special drawing of
jurors. The manner in which they were drawn
was illeral, and the Court was referred to the
acts of 1834, 1869 and 1874.
The motion was overruled by Judge White,
who stated that the point was one which unquestronably deserved immediate and serious
consideration on the part of the Sheriff.
The case was then taken up. The defense
outlined its policy as being that of self-defense,
and that the prisoner was innocented any intention to cause the death of Mr. Campbell.
The prosecution proved the striking of the de-

tention to cause the death of Mr. Campbell. The prosecution proved the striking of the deceased by the defendant.

Mr. Paradine, when placed on the stand, testified that when he showed or strack the deceased, Campbell's back was turned to him. This settled any question of soil-defense, and Judge White refused to allow any further testimony on that ground.

The arguments to the jury were very short, as was the Court's charge. The jury then retired, and after being out two hours, returned a verdict convicting the defendant of the charge of involuntary manusianguter.

CALLING DOWN COUNTERFEITERS. United States Officers Keeping a Good Eye

on Them. In the United States District Court vester day Simon Fritz, alias John Falk, was convicted of passing counterfelt money. Fritz was arrested by the Allegheny police while passing some of the coin in Allegheny. One hundred and eighteen counterfeit half dollars were found in his possession. United States Detective McSweeney worked up the case and traced Fritz and a companion named John Pfeiffer from Chicago, whence they started out with \$1,000 worth of counterfeit half dollars in their possession. They went to Detroit, Cleve-

land, Columbus and Pittsburg, distributing the coin. When Fritz was arrested in Allegheny Pfeiffer jumped out and returned to Chicago, the was arrested, there, and is now on his way to Pittsburg for trial. His case will come up These men put considerable coin in circulation, and it was some of the same that Reese and Porter, who were arrested on the South-side, had in their possession. They were dis-charged by the United States Commissioner, and Detective McSweeney now says there is no question but what they were innocent men, and obtained the coin legitimately.

Daniel S. Tobin, of McKeesport, yesterday received a verdict for \$72 15 in his suit against the Western Union Telegraph Company. The suit was for damages for inconveniences to Tobin, caused by a mistake in a telegram re-ceived by him. Tobin's sister, while in New York, was accidentally drowned. The body was recovered and the Coroner of Staten Island telegraphed to Tobin.

The message, by an error, read South Carolina instead of Staten Island, when it reached Tobin, and he, not knowing the circumstances of his aster's death, started for South Carolina. He met with considerable trouble before he learned, where the body was, and brought suit for damages.
