NOTES FROM THE INDUSTRIAL FIELD

Much comment has been made on the tardiness with which local manufacturers have refrained from taking advantage of the protection afforded them under the newlypassed tariff law to develop their business and invest in still larger enterprises. This has been more especially the case regarding any of the oft-spoken about tinplate making respects materializing.

Prior to the passage of the act the air was full of the large plants that only awaited the encouragement afforded by the tariff to spring into full working order; and the extreme de sire of manufacturers to engage in this species of money making was cited as an additional reason why the measure increasing the import duty should become law. It was currently reported that all the black plate only awaited the signing of the bill to turn out tinned plate ov the square vard, and that the price of the article named would fall in consequence of the large importations which would follow on the bill becoming

But so far none of these projects have shown any signs of life, and tinplate has risen slightly, with every indication of it going higher. Regarding the latter, it may be mentioned here that the Welshmen evince a disposition to be very conservative in contracting ahead in this country, and seem rather disposed to await developments bere before shipping to any extent.

The reason for this apparent apathy on

the part of manufacturers and capitalists is easy to find. They are, in fact—to use a sporting metaphor—fighting low. While recognizing that the tariff measure affords m sufficient protection against the foreign article, they are chary of investing money in the business until they form some idea of the probable duration of the protective tariff. They will, in short, do nothing until the complexion of the new Congress becomes visible.
