Owing to the system of gathering election returns in Philadelphia none of the city returns commenced to come in to the State rooms before 10:30. About the first returns that came at all were from the Eleventh ward, Eighth ward and Thirteenth wards of Pittsburg. They showed slight gains for Delamater and created considerable enthusiasm. But this was quickly squelched when the scattering precincts of the Eighteenth ward of Pittsburg came in.
