BEELIN, November 9.—Prof. Bergmann inoculated 15 consumptive patients on Thursday with Prof. Koch's process, and on the following day exhibited one of the patients before a number of physicians in order to show the change that had resulted within 24 hours.

The Boston Courier says it has authority for the statement that Prof. Koch's remedy has proved to be a success. A famous German surgeon, it says, was cured within five days of the light house service.

CAUSE FOR REJOICING.

ROME.—The Reform says that the visit of the German Chancellor to Italy is an event over which the two nations should rejoice, as it affords a confirmation of the existence of friendly relations between the two countries.

As the train moved off the Chancellor was vociferously cheered. When the locomotive started the train stopped, and General Von Caprivi sent a telegram to the Emperor and Kaiser.

THOUSANDS OUT OF WORK.

BERLIN.—The shoe manufacturers at Erfurt have declared a lockout in consequence of a dispute arising from the dismissal of a workman. Three thousand men are thrown out of employment.
