

AN IMPORTANT STAGE

Of the Developments Throughout the Petroleum Territory.

SOME BIG PRODUCERS REPORTED.

A Decided Change in the Current of Events in Butler County.

LATEST FROM THE VARIOUS FIELDS

The kaleidoscopic condition of the field for the past week is one of great interest, and should receive the close attention of the producer. Butler county has again changed front by opening up a large scope of prospective territory, as indicated by the advent of the Bishop and Wahl well, on the Jacob Damback farm. While the well in fact has been over estimated as to production, its importance upon future developments cannot be ignored, and it is reasonably safe to predict that the high standard of production in the banner field of the Southwest will not decline to any great extent for some time to come. Guckert & Steele's Humphrey No. 5 will resume drilling in the morning, and the chances are it will surprise many operators in the 100 feet.

Their No. 4, Humphrey, which had subsided to 200 barrels a day, took an erratic turn yesterday, and of its own volition more than doubled its production. Their Davidson farm also remains in statu quo, but as the drill is still bouncing, a change at any time would not be surprising. It is generally conceded that the Rough run well is a flash in the pan, and at best can only make a small pumper. The tubing and rods were sent out from Butler this morning, and the venture will soon be subjected to the turning process. In the Saxonburg old Gold pool there has nothing transpired out of the ordinary, and there is no new work here under way that is of special interest from a prospective view. As Mr. Guckert said, however, that Joe Millison's failure in the latter pool has somewhat detracted from the honors won by the Butcher's gusher some time ago.

THE NEW PRODUCTION. During the week Willwood has added to its completed list five or six wells, half of which are more than ordinary producers. The Burns & Steele No. 3, Simpson, was a surprise to many, while the Roth Oil Company's No. 7, Hill, is reported as doing 25 inches an hour, or at the rate of 1,500 barrels a day. Greenlee & Fort were also rewarded with two fair producers, with the chance of a prospective view. The Governor Puttison well, on the Robleshoe farm, is still making over 3,000 barrels a day without agitation. The same barrels are looking for the sand in No. 2 on the same farm, located 250 feet west from No. 1, to-morrow or Monday. If location goes for anything, this should be in the general acceptance of the term, a big well. Harpall & Co., on the Zeigler tract, are also expected to-morrow, or Monday at the latest. It is reported to-night that the Both Oil Company No. 3, Kretzer, is in the first pay and doing 20 barrels an hour. This, however, is only a rumor, which, owing to the lateness of the hour, could not be confirmed. The Smith Farm Oil Company, too, will begin in their No. 4 and 5, Smith, Tuesday or Wednesday, which, owing to their proximity to the Young and Simpson farm wells, should be at least ordinary producers, while the indications are favorable for something better. The Fogel well, owned by the Kanawha Oil Company, has 600 feet of oil in the hole and still drilling. The next few days will witness important events in the Willwood field.

ON THE RETROGRADE. The Charters pool, with the exception of a 100-foot development in three or four wells in the eastern extension, is decidedly on the retrograde move. The sand is found in the centennial sand is by no means big, ranging from 10 to 20 barrels to the well. This fact, however, to the operator, is not a matter of great concern, as the developments in this horizon, the extent of which will be determined as time progresses. Coropolis or Thorn Run has added to her reputation in the past few days in the bringing in of Colonel Gilmore & Co.'s Logan No. 2, which is classed as a good well. From noon yesterday until noon to-day it put five feet in a 250-barrel tank, or about 150 barrels an hour. The Coropolis annex is beginning to assume important proportions, and it is only a question of time until it will become an important factor in the production of the Southwest. There has nothing come in at Mansfield, and it will be several days before the Mellon well, on the Scott, is deep enough for a thorough test. It was reported to-night that well showed a little black sand in the Gordon sand.

THE ONLY NEW FEATURE in the extreme Southwest pools is the St. Mary's well, which practically belongs to the Belmont field. The true status of this well is not exactly known, but the prevailing opinion is that it will not amount to much. H. Mc. WILLING TO STAND TRIAL.
