posure long before court adjourned. TESTIMONY OF A NEIGHBOR. David Packer deposed that he lived within 500 yards of the Douglass residence, and saw Myers going in that direction, and ten minutes later heard a shot in the direction of the house. As Mrs. Storm and Mrs. Kirk testified to having seen the prisoner driving in the same direction a short time before, their stories were corroborative of Packer's.

They were accompanied by two smiling gentlemen, who stood up to answer the necessary questions. The ladies were sisters, Misses Annie and Minnie Hazel, of Wilmerding. The gentlemen were W. J. McNeelis, of Latrobe, and James Harkey, of Derry. The smiles faded away, however, when it was discovered that the licenses could not be issued.

One of the ladies was 18 and the other 16 years of age and as their tather had disappeared several years ago his necessary consent could not be obtained. Other relatives would not do and a lawyer was hunted up. He went into Court and as the rule of the Orphans' Court is not to hinder matrimony, business was suspended and an uncle of the girls appointed their guardian. They quarreled about a year ago when Myers told his aunt that he would have her in the poorhouse ere long."


