Members of the International League Meet at a Banquet.

OBSERVING THE SABBATH DAY.

Business That Was Transacted by the Convention Testerday.

MORE STRINGENT LAWS CALLED FOR

Nearly 200 members of the International Law and Order League and their lady friends were entertained at a banquet last night at the Seventh Avenue Hotel by the Pittsburg League.

There was a very fine meau, and it is hardly necessary to say that anything stronger than water did not figure thereon. Previous to the bauquet there was a reception in the parlors. Among those who attracted much attention was the venerable Edward Everett Hale, whose entertaining talk kept him constantly surrounded.

In the banquet hall the guests were arranged along two tables extending nearly the length of the room. Major W. B. Negley, who presided, was seated in the center of one, on his right being Judge Bonney, President of the Chicago League, and who was toastmaster; while on his left was Mr. Hale. Next to Judge Bonney was John M. Langston, the well-known colored Virginian.

WELCOME AND RESPONSES.

After prayer by Rev. Mr. McGlory, the guests devoted themselves to the feast. Then Judge Negley made the address of welcome. He claimed that much had seen done through the aid of the society in Western Pennsylvania to make the Sunday such as the law intended that it should be. He also paid a compliment to Chief Brown, of the Department of Public Safety, whom, he sain, was doing much toward shaping the city into

Judge Bonney, President of the Chicago local Law and Order Society, followed on behalf of the United States. During the short address he said he hoped the day was coming when there would be not only receiprocity in temperance and virtue, but also in more material matters. Referring to the in more material matters. Referring to the work of the league he said it was only the superuacy of the law that would prevent fire, rapine and murder. He thought the face of civil and religious liberty is now in danger in this country. He criticised the errors of the this country. He criticised the errors of the leaders of political parties, who forgot that the leaders of political parties, who forgot that the league was going to be a new political balance of power. At the conclusion of this speech the audience sang, "My Country Tis of the Thee," "When Bad Men Conspire Good Men Must Combine," was the subject of the address of Rev. Edward Everett Hale. Satan, he said, served the servants of the Lord. The league was engaged in a contest against the politics of the country just as the free sollers were engaged in a contest against the slave holders. The liquor power is sollething immense and there is need of combination to fight it. When people denounced what they termed the Partian Sabbath they apparently knew not of what they talked. God give us law in liberty and liberty to law.

THE PIEST SESSION INFORMAL. While the attendance at the morning session of the much annual convention of the International Law and Order League was not large --there being not 20 delegates present-it was of a representative character, most of those of a representative present being men of national reputation, such as Edward Everett Hale, the literateur; Colonel T. Edwin Dudley, a well-known veteran; Major I. Bond, of Montreal, and President

Bonney of Chicago.

The first session at the Y. M. C. A. chapel was of an informal character. Rev. Leavid Mc ister delivered a short prayer, after which endent Bonney said that the objects of the etings were twofold. The Law and Order meetings were twofold. The Law and Order League represents the sovereignty of the people and the law. The leagues were created to show to the people that the supremacy of the law is necessary to the perpetuity of free governments and republic. Incidentally the Law and Order Leagues interfered to secure a better discharge of the laws when the officials in the country allow them to be abused. The results have been of the most gratifying character in the United States and Canada.

The speakers of the morning were Major Bonder, all of whom dweltar length on the amount of good work done by the law and order societies in the past and what they expect to accomplish in the future.

A SHORT BUSINESS MEETING. The business meeting of the International Convention of the Law and Order League was | and Market street. held yesterday afternoon in the chapel of the Young Men's Christian Association. The meeting was opened with short devotional exercises, after which Dr. Crafts arose and delivered an address. His remarks were in part a cree an address. His remarks were in part a repotition of those made at the closing session of the Sabhath Reform Association held in the Eighth Reformed Presbyterian Church Wednesday night. At the close of his remarks Dr. Crafts was honored by being elected Secretary of the International Law and Order League.

Captain Richardson, of the Trenton, N. J., society, was then called upon to give the report of his district. He said their organization had been in existence six years, and emphatically a steel that he did not believe a stranger cound get a drink of rum from a saloon on Sunday within the city limits of Trenton.

Captain Wishart bext gave the report of his district. He said there was a much better observance of the Sabhath now than formerly, and that the prosecutions made by the society during the first year after its organization were effective that there were now very few prosecutions, and the saloon keepers and others were strictly obeying the law.

Mr. Gyger, of Philadelphia, was called upon for the report for his district. He was the originator of the Philadelphia society. He said that in their work out of 1,000 speak-easies the first year they closed 69 of them. He favored the Brooks law as he declared that the number of saloons in Philadelphia under the Brooks law had been reduced from \$600 to 1,300. He said that the people of the Law and Order societies should have backbones like steel, and repetition of those made at the closing

number of saloons in Philadelphia under the Brooks law had been reduced from 8,00 tel, 300. He said that the people of the Law and Order societies should have backbones like sized, and not like shoestrings, that they may not he swerved from the purpose they have in view. He said that mest men obey the law, not because they love it, but because they are obliged to for self-preservation. He further stated that in Philadelphia the jury system seemed to be decided yin their favor, as they had won verdicts in eight out of every ten cases tried. Id. Burton, of Philadelphia, then arose, and during the course of his remarks, said that the number of arcests in Philadelphia the first year after the establishment of their society was decreased 8,000. The second year the number dropped 4,000 under that of the previous year, making a total decrease of nearly 13,000 in two years. In conclusion, he said that in a city where \$6,000 arrests were made every year, the results thus far attained were very encouraging.
