DEFENDANTS IN THE WORKHOUSE.  
A Case Postponed Until a Habeas Corpus Could Be Issued.  
An unusual procedure took place in the Common Pleas Court yesterday before Judge Stone. The case of Margaret Eicheley against John and Bridget Laffey was called for trial. It was an action in ejectment to obtain possession of a small piece of ground, the ownership of which is claimed by the plaintiff. When the case came on for trial, the court adjourned until the next day, as the plaintiff, Mrs. Laffey, had been convicted in the Criminal Court of illegal liquor selling and was serving their sentences in the workhouse.

A WILL CONTEST.  
John Scott's Letter Probated as His Last Testament.  
A hearing was had before Judge Over, of the Orphan's Court, yesterday in the contest of the will of the late John Scott. The will in question was in the form of a letter to Hon. John Ditzel, Mr. Scott's attorney, setting forth the bequest to make and was in the form of a letter. It was not a will, as it was not in writing, but it was admitted as such because it was in the handwriting of the testator and was proved by the signature and contents of the letter and the arguments heard. The Judge reserved his decision.

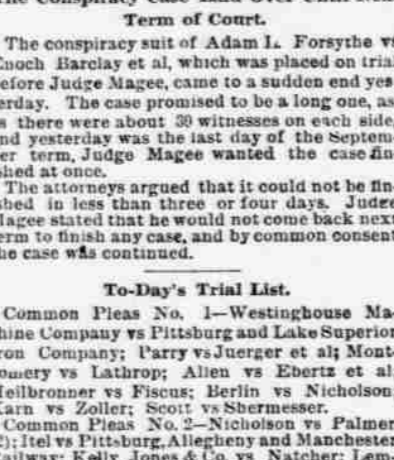
BY COMMON CONSENT.

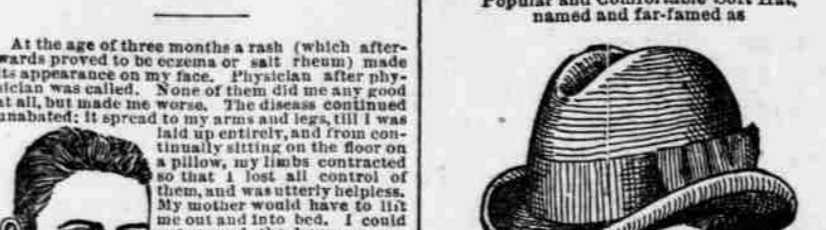
