

BAARD FAITH CHARGED

By Senator Voorhees Against the Government, as the Cause of the Present Indian Trouble.

SOME DAMAGING CHARGES MADE. The Savages, Desperate From the Pangs of Hunger, He Says, Are Being Driven Into War.

GEN. MILES QUOTED AS AUTHORITY. Senator Davis Says the Indian War Arise From Good Intent.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—In the Senate today Mr. Hawley, from the Committee on Military Affairs, reported and asked to have put upon its passage a joint resolution, authorizing the Secretary of War to issue arms and ammunition to the States of North and South Dakota.

Mr. Manderson moved to amend it by also including the State of Nebraska. Mr. Voorhees said that if the proposition were to issue 100,000 rounds of food to the starving Indians it would be more consistent with Christian civilization.

Some Grave Charges Made. The Indians had no newspapers to make known their sufferings and privations. They had been suffering for years in silence. There was blood-guiltiness somewhere in connection with it. The hostilities into which the Indians were plunged were being started would result not merely in the destruction of the lives of many Indians, but the lives of thousands of American citizens and hundreds of American soldiers.

He disliked to talk; he disliked to criticize; he disliked to animadvert on anybody; but, he repeated, there was a crime somewhere in the policy of the Government toward these Indians which somebody ought to answer for. When he asked General Miles whether something could not be done to prevent hostilities, the General's answer was that he feared it was too late.

Mr. Hawley said that he did not know that he had any objection to the remarks of the Senator from Indiana, except that they were perhaps a little florid and exaggerated. He, too, had been thinking, as he presumed that most American citizens had been, that 100,000 rounds of food would be worth more than 100,000 bullets.

Religious Grace the Cause. Mr. Dawes, Chairman of the Committee on Indian Affairs, said a good deal of what the Senator from Indiana had stated was undoubtedly true.

Mr. Voorhees—Does not General Miles say that the Indians have been hungry for two years? Mr. Dawes—He may have said it to the Senator from Indiana.

Mr. Voorhees—He says it in his published interview.

Mr. Hawley—I am nearer to the Indians than General Miles. I have seen them in that sense of the agencies there are Indians who complain of insufficient food.

Mr. Voorhees paid a high compliment to the Senator and the good qualities of General Miles and said that he would take his statement far sooner than that of a Senator who lived near the reservation, and who (with his people) wanted to get the Indian lands as soon as possible.
