SLEET AT LEXINGTON, KY.

It Enins Electric Wires of All Kinds, Damaging Them \$10,000.

LEXINGTON, KY., Dec. 26 .- The heaviest storm of sleet ever known here occurred yesverday afternoon and during the night. Shade trees and telegraph and telephone poles were broken and miles of wire were down. The city fire alarm system was entirely ruined, many of the boxes being burned out. The Western Union telegraph wires were down, and not until 9 o'clock this morning had Lexington any communi-cation with the outside world.

At this writing there is but one wire in operation between Lexington and Cincin-The electric street car lines were sialt. adly damaged. The loss will be about \$10,000.
