Some of the Republican leaders, urged on by Collector Cooper, will make an attempt to have a bill passed for the calling of a Constitutional Convention; and among other arguments with which they will seek to popularize thescheme will be that under section 4. of Article VIII., in the organic law, requiring the numbering of each ballot cast, the proposed ballot reform upon the lines of the Australian system cannot be accom-

Collector Cooper will meet with a strong opposition to his proposition, and the opponents of the scheme have already what they regard as sufficient reply to his ballot retorm plan. The section complained of, if found to be a real obstacle, can be removed as quickly by a special amendment to the Constitution as the work of a convention could be made effective.

Secreey Without Any Amendment. A ballot reform bill, which will have the sanction of the Ballot Reform Association and meet all the requirements, providing for a personal registration, such as will preelection, will be presented early in the session and ample time given for its full and fair discussion. This bill contemplates a scheme which will assure perfect secrecy without any violation of the numbering clause of the State Constitution.
