All is not harmony at present in the camp of local insurance underwriters. Most of the dissatisfied seen yesterday

were rather guarded in their utterances, but one, under promise that his name should not be used, had this to say:
"The action of four of the leading fire in-

surance companies having agencies in this city has given rise to a good deal of unfavorable comment among the insurance fraternity. It seems that the White Lead Trust lately formed, and which embraces all the white lead concerns in the city, has canceled all the fire insurance on the plants here and replaced the same through a New York broker, the same being placed with a syndicate formed by the 'Phoenix,' of Brooklyn; the 'Phenix,' of London; the 'Com-mercial Union,' of Philadelphia, and the 'London, Liverpool and Globe,' All four of these companies have authorized agencies who are presumed to have entire control of the business written here. A standing rule of the Board of Underwriters, we understand, precludes agencies here from paying a commission to New York or other puside brokers on all business legitimately belonging to this field, and this action of the companies named in ignoring the usual methods and courtesies of the business, and taking the entire lead business, at one swoop, from our local agencies, that have heretofore coutrolled it, is a decidedly new feature of the trust business, and, if continued in the same manner by all other trust combines, will lead to a loss of all the fire insurance on similar concerns in the city.

At Present Amounts to 21.46 Per Thousand, Per Annum.

The mortuary report for the week ending January 3 shows a total of 101 deaths in the city. Of these, 25 occurred in the old city wards, 35 in the East End, 30 on the Southside This is a death rate of 21.46 per thousand per

Of the deaths, 22 were caused by pneumonia Of the deaths, 22 were caused by pneumonia. 9 by phthisis pulmonals, 8 by typhoid fever, 3 by diphtheria and 4 by bronchitis. Thirty-two of the deceased were married, 59 single, 8 widows, 1 widower, 1 not stated; 20 were under 1 year of arge, 9 were over 70 and 2 were over 80 years of arge; 44 were natives of Pittsburg, 22 of other parts of the United States, 14 of Ireland, 9 of Germany, 7 of other parts of Europe and 5 not stated, Four were colored.

STILL THOUGHT TO BE A GASSER. Plenty of Salt Water Struck at the Shooting of the Exposition Well.

The Exposition gas well was again shot at ll o'clock yesterday morning. Sixty quarts of nitroglycerine, contained in three cones were sunk to the depth of 1,800 feet. When shot the well filled with salt water, stopping en-

the well filled with salt water, stopping en-tirely the flow of gas. It will be several days before the water can be pumped out, and the result of the experiment cannot be made mani-fest unit this is done.

Mr. Hawkins, who shot the well, is of the opinion that the output of gas will be con-siderably greater than it was before. There was no indication of oil after the experiment, so that speculation as to the well being an oil producer has been abandoned.
