An Act Almost the Same as the Billingsley Bill Introduced.

THE INDEPENDENT MEN FAVOR IT.

The Great Wildwood Field Has Probably Seen Its Best Days.

NEWS FROM THE VARIOUS OIL FIELDS

The following is the complete text of the new pipe line bill which the independent producers are trying to formulate into a law. The measure is almost identical with the old

"An act to regulate the transportation and storage of petroleum by means of pipe lines and tanks, to limit the charge therefor, to regulate deductions for sediment and other losses, and to prohibit the removal of lines running from producing petroleum fields to the sea-board from this to any other State, and imposing penalties for the violation of same.

Section 1—Be it enacted, etc., That it shall be the duty of every corporation and partnerciation, limited or otherwise, and of all and every other person and persons now or hereafter engaged in the business, transporting or storing crude petroleum of gravity exceeding 85° Baume at a temperature of 60° Fabrenheit, by means of pipes and tanks, to deliver any petroleum received by them respectively for storage and transporta-

respectively for storage and transportation, or either, or petroleum of like kind and quality, at any point within this Commonwealth reached by their respective pipe lines used for the transportation of petroleum of like quality which the owners of such petroleum may designate for such delivery.

"Section 2—That no corporation, partnership, association, limited or otherwise, or other person or persons, now or hereafter engaged in the business of transporting and storing crude petroleum of gravity exceeding 35° Baume, at a temperature of 60° Fahrenheit, by means of pipes and tanks, shall hereafter demand or receive any compensation in excess of 12 cents for each barrel of 42 gallons of such petroleum for all such services performed in receiving, storing, for any period not exceeding 30 days, transporting and delivering the same, or other petroleum of like quality, to any point not more than 50 miles distant from the point where the same shall be received, and 3 cents additional 50 miles or fractional part thereof, that the same may be transported in any case of a transportation which shall begin and end within this Commonwealth.

"Section 4—That no corporation, partnership, association, limited or otherwise, or other person or persons engaged in the business of transporting and storing crude petroleum of gravity exceeding 35° Baume, at a temperature of 60° Fairenbeit, by means of pipes and tanks, shall deduct from any such petroleum received by them respectively for transportation and storage more than 2 per cent thereof, or make any charge for water, sediment, waste and the like, and all and every such corporation, association, person or persons shall make said reduction of charge at the time when such petroleum shall be so received, and at no other time. Provided, that in case of loss of any petroleum while in the custodly of any such corporation, partnership, association, of other person or persons, caused by fire, lightning, storm or other unavoidable cause, and loss shall be borne pro rata by the owners of all the restriction. loss shall be borne pro rata by the owners of all the petroleum in such custody at the time

Section 5-That if any corporation, partner-

"Section 5—That if any corporation, partnership association, limited or otherwise, engaged in the business of transportation of and storing crude petroleum, having any line running from the producing fields to the seaboard, shall take up or discontinue any such lines, such act shall forfeit its charter and franchises.

"Section 6—If any person or persons, partnerships, associations, limited or otherwise, or corporations engaged in the business of transporting and storing crude petroleum within this Commonwealth shall violate any of the provisions of this act, the person or persons so offending, and any president, chair, nan, director, manager or other officer or agent of any such corporation or limited partnership or association so offending, who shall directly or indirectly participate in, assent to, or knowingly permit as such violation, shall be guilty of a permit as such violation, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to may a fine not exceeding \$5,000 and undergo an imprisonment not ex-ceeding two years for each offense."

This conclusion is drawn from the rapid decline of the Runga well, which, when struck, started off at a 100 barrel rate, but in the next 24 hours declined to one-half this amount. A number of operators were of the opinion that the Runga would find a second pay, but if reports are true, the well has passed the point where the second pay was found in the Ringheisen. Up to to-night the well on the P. & W. lot has not improved any by deeper drilling. Greenlee & Forst is ten feet in the sand and flowing by heads. Their No. 1, same lot, is 12 feet in the sand, with about the same showing. Kress No. 7 is doing 135 barrels an hour. from the rapid decline of the Runga well,

Synopsis of the Work of Three Fields. The following is a synopsis of the work completed and now under way in the Westview, Jack's Run and Haysville districts for the month of January: McCormack & Co. comuleted a ten-barrel well on the Strom farm, and the American Club also gota ten-barrel well on the McLaurhton. Guffy & Queen got 3. 29-barreler on the Hays, while the Augusta Oil Company, on the Oat, and Smith & Klimmonds on the Ivory, are in the sand. The Baxter Oil Company so the McCalmont Oil Company's No. 1, on the Baxter farm, is down 1,700 feet; the McCalmont Oil Company's No. 1, on the Rouser, 2,000 feet, and Bowman & Co. No. 2, on the Scheeds, 200 feet.

The rigs up and building are as follows: The Westview Oil Company have a rig up for their No. 5, on the Ivory farm: Grabam & Co. have one up for their No. 1 Keating farm; the Ohio Valley Gas Company have a rig up for their No. 2 Knock, and Heber & Co. No. 2, on the Hilke. The following is a synopsis of the work com-

Near the Interesting Point. WEST VIEW-Smith & Kimmond's No. 1, lvory farm, was cased to-day, and with no more bad luck should reach the interesting spot Fri-day or Saturday. This well was started over day or Saturday. This well was stayted over three months ago, and after reaching a depth of 1,500 feet, they plugged the hole and had to move the rig. Bowman & Co, are doing nothing at their No. 2 well on the Scheide farm. They reached a depth of 930 feet, when the cable played out and they are waiting on a new one. Montall & Co,'s No. 1 has reached a uepth of 2,000 feet on the Rouser farm, with no show of oil. They are going through the fourth sand before giving it up. This well was started eight months ago, and like the Saith & Klimmonds well, after reaching a depth of 1,500 feet, they nlugged the hole, and after fishing two months moved the rig. The West View Oil Company has a rig up on the Ivory farm for their No. 5. Captain Grace and Knox sold their one well on the Mill property, doing about five barrels per day, to unknown parties for a consideration of \$2,800. No. 1 Straw farm, which came in last week, is good for ten barrels a day. Heber & Co, have a rig up for their No. 2, Hilke farm, and are getting timbers on the ground for No. 3.

JACK'S RUN—The last well drilling in this neck of the woods, the Augusta Oil Company's No. 1, Ort farm, is now drilling in the sand and has made several nice flows, but will not make over a 25-barrel well when they get through drilling. The wells here make a big showing at first, but soon drop off to small wells unless they keep agitating them. The Thayer & Co. No. 2 well, which was shot ten days ago, is still making ten inches a day. This is the best well in the field.

Of late the torpedo men have been here most of the time, shooting and waiting on others to get ready to shoot. The Hicker No. 2, shot a week ago, which started off at 100 barrels a day, but is now down to 20 barrels. Patterson & Co. shot their No. 1 well, Goss farm, to-day. It gassed nicely after the shot, and it is not likely that it will break the market very bad as a producer of oil. The same parties have cleaned out their No. 1 well, on the Patterson farm, which will probably increase its production some. Pettocks & Co. have finally got their No. 1 Heim for cleaned out and intend giving it a shot. The Miller Oil Company No. 1, Beverdanf farm, are cleaning out and will probably give it a shot as soon as through. The Helm Oil Company want to give their No. 3 Heim a shot as soon as they can get the oil bailed down helow the casing. The Robella Oil Company are cleaning out their No. 1 S raw, but it has had so many shots now that the sand keeps running in as fast as they can take it out. They will awaken it again with another shot as soon as they get through cleaning out.

An Incentive to Active Drilling.

Heover farm, which was drilled several months ago, while it was not very prolific, has been the incentive to considerable other work in that locality. William Lecky & Co. will also drill several wells in this locality, and the Citizens' will drill a well 1½ miles cast.

WISCONSIN SCHOOL LEGISLATION

Republicans Will Attempt to Correct Defects in the Bennett Act.

Madison, Wis., Jan. 22.—There is little

doubt that the Democrats will succeed in their effort to repeal the Bennett school law, though the Republicans will make a determined fight for its retention. The Democrats will then present a new measure to correct the defects in the old law of 1879, and providing for compulsory education and the prohibition of child labor in factories. The Republicans to-day introduced in the Senate a bill in the nature of a substitute for the Bennett law. The proposed act provides that every parent or other person, having under his control a child between the ages of 7 and 13 years, shall cause the said child to attend some public, private or parochial school during the school year for a period of not less than 12 weeks, but provision is made for excuse on account of physical disability. The fourth section touches a matter which was the hinge of the campaign, in which the supporters of the Bennett law suffered overwhelming defeat. It meets the objections of the supporters of the parochial schools, while it at the same time maintains the principle of education in the legal language of the country. The section is as

Every parent or other person having under his control a child between the age of 7 and 13 years, shall furnish it such instruction in the English language as shall enable it to read and write the same, but this act shall not be construed to prohibit any other language or branches of learning.






