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A BLOODY BOYCOTT. Riotous White Miners in Central Alabama Kill Negroes Who TAKE THE PLACE OF STRIKERS.

Conflicting Reports as to the Exact Number of Fatalities. STATE TROOPS NOW UPON THE SCENE.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 1.—Carroll Hill, a mining center 30 miles from here, is in the hands of rioters. The first bloodshed occurred on Friday night. Then four negroes were shot dead and five others severely wounded, three of them perhaps fatally.

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
