It would be an affectation of miliference unworthy of the Senate, unworthy of myself and unworthy of this occasion, were I to pretend to be unconscious of the distinction that has been conferred upon me by the suffrages of the Senate, and I should be alike wanting in sensibility and destitute of gratitude were I to withhold the expression of my grateful appreciation of the confidence and the consideration, so long continued, with which I have been honoured by the most dignified, the most important and the most influential legislative assembly in the world.


