THE DOMINION CAMPAIGN'S EFFECT.

A Reavy Decrease of the Available Stocks of Wheat en the Pacific Coast.

SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH. NEW YORK, Feb. 20 .- The volume of general trade has tended to decrease rather than the reverse during the week. Telegrams to Bradstreet's from Philadelphia, Duluth, Omaha and Chicago point in that direction. Mild weather and a disposition on the part of jobbers to discriminate in the matter of credits are largely responsible, though colder weather has appeared at the West, stimulating the demand to some

extent. Jobbing in drygoods has not improved, somewhat less than last week. The chief activity in drygoods is in cotton and wool dress goods. Print cloths are firmer, but brown and bleached cottons are quiet. The demand for wool is limited by small stocks of choice at leading markets. Full prices are paid for Australians, which are active. Raw cotton is 3-16 cents lower on a heavy crop movement and the lack of a corresponding increase in demand.

No New Life in Iron Yet. Sugar is dull after last week's activity. The receipts at New Orleans are checked, as are those of cotton and of rice. Iron is as dull as ever, the exceptions being some

The excitement attending the political canvass in the Dominion of Canada naturally tends to check the volume of trade there, Jobbers, notably of drygoods, are not pushing sales at present. Collections are not as prompt as desired. Hog products and barley are lower. There is a good demand for wheat for export. The Dominion of Canada reports 52 failures this week, against 38 last week and 34 this week last year. The total number from January 1 to date is 383, against 356 last year.

Decrease of Shipments From Chicago. R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review says: There is still much uncertainty about the future of trade. Eastbound shipments from Chicago for half of February have been 146,957 tors, against 205,283 last year, a loss shortness of crops, but the output and move-

Trust Company has caused some disturbance, but the event has no widespead influence. The tone of the reports from other cities is generally favorable, though there is complaint of collections from the South because cotton is held back for higher prices. Trade is dull at Memphis and At-lants, and fair only at New Orleans. Chicago notes a large increase in wheat movement, but a heavy decrease in dressed beef, lard, hides and wool; sales considerably above last year's in drygoods, clothing and boots and shoes, and satisfactory collections. The tributary region is considered in a healthy condition. Confidence is strong and money plenty among dealers. Detroit notes a quiet trade and only fair collections, but at Cleveland and Pittsburg seme improvement in iron is noticed, the later re-porting finished iron in good demand and blooms stronger, the coke strike having some influence. At Cincinnati trade is average, especially in drygoods and with the

The decline of silver below \$1 per ounce at one time to 9734 cents, discourages those who were looking or a speculative boom in prices. Wheat is 1 cent lower, with sales of 15,000,000 bushels; cotten a quarter lower, with sales of 677,000 bales, and oil 36 cents lower. Corn and oats have advanced half a cent each, and hogs a shade. The exports of cotton continue above last year's, as well as e receipts; but wheat and flour exports fall

549,583 in value, against \$56,365,724 last year, which points to a heavy excess of ex-ports over imports for that month; but the later advance in sterling exchange and the moderate outgo of gold indicate that the merchandise balance is outweighed at present by the return of securities or the with-drawal of other capital previously invested here. To this movement, probably, the laws passed or pending in some Western States contribute. 





