## WORK OF THE MONTH.

A Concise Review of the Doings of the Derrick for February.

THE BULLS HAVE CAUSE TO LAUGH.

As the Figures in the Report Decidedly Favor Producers.

BOME REASONS FOR THE FALLING OFF

If the producers so far have not met with the success anticipated in the passage of the Burdick bill they surely can find some consolation in February's report. At no time since the shut down movement has the report presented such a bullish aspect, and the producers have the best of reasons to expect better prices in the near future. The report of the entire field shows a decline of 6,927 barrels as compared with January, or a falling off of about one-half of new production. In January there were 319 of new production. In January there were 319 wells completed while in February the finished list foots up 243, which is a decrease of 76. There is an increase of three drilling wells, a decrease of 88 rig and a total decrease of 88. It may be said there are only two points of interest in the field during the month. One of these is a slight extension of the southwest line at Wildwood and the other is the birth of three or four fifth and wells at McCurdy of more than ordinary caliber.

than ordinary caliber.

The figures for Butler county complete, showing the work performed by the drill and the rig builder for the month of February, are as follows: Wells completed, \$2, of which 8 were of the builder for the month of February, are as fol-lows; Wells completed, \$2, of which 8 were of the duster character; new production, 1,450 barrels; drilling, \$2; new rigs, \$5. This shows about a "stand-off," with the exception of the new pro-duction, which is a decline of about 400 barrels. Nearly all the little pools or cases shows a falling off, with the exception of Jefferson Center, Callery and Barmony, where there is sufficient new work to offset the decline at other points. No well was completed in Butler county during the month that has any direct importance in determining a new line or open-ing a new pool. In fact, the district has been pretty thorougly perforated, every town-ship in the county having been invaded by the untiring and, in many cases, reckless operator. The famous Little Cre & (100-foot) is about ready to have an inquest held over it. The new wark is comparatively nothing and many of the old wells have ceased to produce. It is a notable fact when a 100-footer becomes a non-producer it is with a suddenness that is distress-ing to its owner. The harrible condition of the roads accounts in a measure for the decline in operations. 


