burg Preperty Owners. BUSINESS HOUSES TOO SMALL.

A Few of the Interesting Features of Carson Street Pointed Out. STOCK YARDS AGITATION SETTLED

A New York man was in the city yester day trying to rent a large business house, but failed. This led him to say: "I am sur prised at the smallness of the rooms in which business is transacted in Pittsburg. The most of them are mere boxes compared with those in other cities. I notice there is plenty of room here in which to expand and build. The trouble seems to be that the lots were laid out originally too small. They met the de-

laid out originally too small. They met the demands of that time, no doubt, but allowed nothing for growth. The consequence is that attempts to carry on business now in the same space as 40 years ago are failures. It can't be done."

There is much truth in this. Those who build should not content themselves with one small lot, 17 or 18 feet front but should buy at least three and put one large or two medium-sized buildings thereon. This would make the owners more money, and at the same time bring in new blood and capital. There would be no delay in renting, such buildings being in constant demand. The sooner Pittsburg owners look at this matter in this light the better it will be for them and the city.

A Great Thoroughfare.

A Great Thoroughfare. Carson street, the principal thoroughfare on the Southside, possesses some interesting features. It is a hive of business. For two or three miles it presents an almost unbroken array of stores and shops, liberally supplied with everything necessary to meet the wants of the community. There are few large concerns, as

community. There are few large concerns, as the business is almost exclusively of a retail character. Milimen are the principal customers, and they want the best. Many of these atores are as handsomely fitted up as any to be found on this side of the river, while the goods displayed are abundant and attractive. A trip from the Smithfield street bridge to Thirteenth street yesterday disclosed only two houses to let. A few improvements were seen, but nothing important. Most of the building is in the vicinity of the railroad bridge and on the hill-tops. The introduction of rapid transit will increase the importance of Carson street by bringing all parts of it into closer relationship with the business and residence centers.

Settled for Good.

It seems to be settled that the East Liberty stockyards are not to be removed to Walls or anywhere eise—just now. Improvements about to be made in the way of buildings and extensions show that they are to remain at Torrens It is well that this matter has been brought to a head. Its periodical agitation from time a head. Its periodical agitation from time immemorial has kept property owners and investors in an u-pleasant frame of mind. They would neither sell nor buy with the doubt hanging over them. But now that they know there will be no change they will be free to act. The removal of the yards would open the way to many valuable improvements which are now impracticable. There will be considerable building out there this season, but the houses will be small.

Lower Allegheny. There is a good movement in realty in the lower wards of Allegheny City, several sales having been closed within the last few days. NEW YORK STOCKS. The Long-Wished-For Adjournment of Congress Fails to Strengthen a Weak Market-A Rally at Midday

Succeeded by a Decline. NEW YORK, March 4.—The final adjourn-ment of Congress brought with it no change in the character of the stock market, and instead of the broadening and widening expected there was rather a return to the narrowness and stag-nation of the past week, even the few stocks which have given tone to the dealings for the ast three days retiring into oblivion with the general list.

The opening of the market this morning was made with some show of animation, but it was all in Burlington, Northern Pacific preferred and Sugar, while prices were lower all along and Sugar, while prices were lower all along the line, and stagnation reigned in the whole list, with the exception of the three leading stocks. The strength in Sugar changed the current of prices upward, however, and a gain of 1½ per cent in Sugar and fractions in the other stocks marked the early trading.

The upward movement, however, was shortlived, and a slow and steady drooping marked the dealings throughout the remainder of the day, which became more pronounced during the afternoon. The Grangers led off, followed by others, and in the afternoon, when the bears found that there was going to be no effort to advance prices, notwithstanding the shouts with which the announcement of the final adjournment of Congress evoked, concerted an attack upon the list all along the line, though Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis, Rock Island, Pacific Mail, Northern Pacific, the Coalers and Lake Shore were most prominent in the decline of the last hour. The decline was sharp and no sign of a raily was seen. The market closed weak at the lowest prices of the day. The Industrials were better supported than anything on the regular list, but all closed lower.
