

NOT BUBBLING OVER.

Iron Men Not Unduly Excited Over the Reduced Freight Rates.

A UNIFORM SCALE SUGGESTED.

Leechburg Is to Be Supplied With Gas for Fuel Purposes.

INDUSTRIAL AND CAPITAL NOTES

The reduction in west-bound freight rates on manufactured iron and steel, authorized by the Central Traffic Association...

The rate to Chicago per gross ton from Pittsburgh will be \$2.30 and \$2 instead of the former sum from Youngstown. All the articles in the old iron classification were checked off to take these rates and worn steel pickets faces added.

Night Be Much Better. This sliding scale of freight rates is not expected by the local manufacturers as the same character and maintain rates without such discrimination between shipper, manufacturer would at all times know just what to expect.

NO RAISE FOR FUNERALS.

The Liverymen's Advanced Scale of Prices Only Apply to Parties. Emanuel Jackson, the Southside undertaker, and president of the liverymen's organization, said yesterday in regard to the new scale of prices adopted for the ensuing year.

There will not be any raise in prices for funeral carriages as before stated, but there will be an increase in prices of carriages for operas, parties, shopping, etc. We have come to the conclusion that \$4 is all that should be charged for a carriage for a party to pay. A liveryman has from \$1,300 to \$1,600 invested in a fine carriage and team when he sends them out on the street, and it would be a very hard case to ever get your money back.

Cloth Advanced in Price. Samuel Frazer, manager of a trouser company in Newburg, is in the city looking for a location to open a branch house. He says the price of cloth on an average has gone up 20 per cent since the passage of the McKinley bill.

Making Large Improvements. The American Iron and Tube Company, of this city, has completed plans for the erection of large additions to their works at Middletown. A lap mill has just been finished, and all preparations are being made for the erection of another lap mill.

Wants to Be Incorporated. The Keystone Manufacturing and Supply Company will apply for a charter of incorporation next Thursday. The object is simply to convert the present firm into a corporation. There will be some improvements and additions to the plant, however.

Facts Are Wanting. The local officials of the flint glass workers are not acquainted with the details of the difficulty at Onamia, Neb., where 300 men have been locked out by the Lantham Glass Works. President Smith will go to Omaha to investigate the case.

Setting the Strike. Word was received in the city yesterday to the effect that the strike at Steelton, Pa., is about settled. Four men have been compelled to lay off, and when a few other irregulars have been attended to work will resume as usual.

Boys and Clerk Sick. Superintendent Elliot Zolbrock and his clerk, B. C. Weiss, of the Baltimore and Ohio road, are confined to their homes

by sickness. They are not seriously ill and expect to be out again in a few days.

DISCUSSED IT ALL DAY.

Mr. Carnegie's Talk Thought By Local Manufacturers to Be Just Right. The statements made by Mr. Andrew Carnegie, published in yesterday's DISPATCH, were thoroughly discussed in industrial circles yesterday. His views were approved generally, and particularly did the coke operators seem to think he was right.

In regard to the coke situation, however, there are local manufacturers who believe the operators are taking advantage of the strike, and will prolong it still further, if necessary, in order to advance the price of coke. At any rate it has resolved itself to a question of endurance.

Secretary Madden, of the Amalgamated Association, thought Mr. Carnegie could not have selected a better time in the year at which to present his views on the labor situation, inasmuch as work on next year's scale has not been commenced, and that concessions are being asked from the railroad. Other labor officials spoke in the same strain.

FUEL FOR LEECHBURG.

New Gas Lines to Be Built for the Healthy Northern Borough. The Pennsylvania Tube Works Company has received an order for \$40,000 worth of wrought iron pipe for a new line for Leechburg, by which the borough is to be supplied with gas for fuel purposes.

The line will consist of four miles of 6-inch pipe and one mile each of 8 and 10-inch pipe, all to be covered by the Pottsville Gas Company's pipe to Leechburg, which is one of the most productive pieces of territory in that neighborhood.
